Course Description	
Course Description	<p>The subject course History of Political Systems belongs to the political-historical field. Subject in general summarizes the matter related to the policies's, political systems and systems of governance. Initially it provides access to the recognition of the politics as a concept and content with special emphasis on its determinants - the power, the state, the government, governance etc. Then the largest share is dedicated to matter - as political systems with special emphasis on their evolution throughout the history. Attention is paid to political systems, monarchical, authoritarian, totalitarian and fascist. Central part of political systems is summarized in the contemporary and democratic political systems. At the end of the subject matter attention has been put to the future and trends of contemporary political systems to systems today.</p>
